# A Letter from Pr. Dana.....

I will soon be leaving for my sabbatical. I will be in the office through Easter. The week after Easter I am headed to Churchwide for the Ecumenical Round Table. I will return to preside on Sunday, April 28, and then I will depart for the sabbatical. As I have learned through this process through the Lilly Endowment Program: This truly is not a vacation. What I mean is, a vacation is 2 weeks if you're lucky, and I will be gone for 15 Sundays! This truly is a renewal; it is so much more than a vacation! I give thanks to God that you have gifted me with this opportunity.

I know I will miss you. I know that this is a gift. I am grateful and will keep you in my heart & prayers while I am gone. I ask that you keep me fervently in prayer also! It has been awhile since we have talked about what I plan to do on this renewal sabbatical so this month I want to share with you a summary statement from the Lilly Endowment Clergy Renewal Program:

The theme for my clergy renewal sabbatical is Connection, Creation, Creativity. In a profession where I am always the leader, the Shepherd – always plugged into technology, on call, praying for others, and being drawn into highly emotional situations – it is easy to lose track of myself. While I do take great joy in my call, it does take its toll physically and emotionally. This clergy renewal sabbatical will allow time to explore who I have become after 9 years of lay ministry and 10 years of ordained ministry.

Connection will be a time to reconnect with myself. My counselor, Shannon, will be the first to tell others that I spend way too much energy taking care of others and leave little to no energy to care for myself. True connection takes time and dedication, forgiveness and love, whether it is a relationship with another or with oneself. I will be very intentional on this sabbatical to integrate ways that I will forgive, love, and spend time taking care of myself, especially my health and body.

Creation is where most people feel the intense wonder and awe of God. As part of my renewal, I will visit places I have never seen. Immersing myself in the beauty and life that lives in the biodiversity of nature will bring me back into connection with the Creator. God's glorious creation reveals itself in myriad ways! This leads me into a sense of awe and wonder.

Creativity has been limited because I'm so immersed in administration. I want to reignite my creative side. Creativity has always brought me joy and energy. Though as pastor I am called into the administrative role, I hope to dip back into the creativity that God has given me so I can reenter the congregation with new creative energy. By focusing on Connection, Creation, Creativity, I hope to find a renewed strength of body, mind, and soul so that I can continue pouring out love and forgiveness with those I am called to shepherd.

We are still on our Lenten journey – headed into the Easter glory! As we gather soon to celebrate the resurrection, I feel that this is a perfect sending for me to explore some resurrection in this renewal sabbatical time.

## A Letter from the Past President......

#### PSSST! WE NEED TO TALK

A Message from your Past-President About Money (and yes, this means YOU)

We need to talk – Council has been diligently caring for the financial strength of Immanuel, and we need to raise some concerns to everyone's attention (in a nutshell: we are in no trouble, but....). First off, and as the projects financed in the "Over the Hill"  $40^{th}$  anniversary campaign are wrapping up, we again want to thank the congregation for your overwhelming outpouring of support. Immanuel is blessed with generous members who step forward for a good cause.

The Council realized when the campaign began that in supporting the new exciting idea the more boring everyday stuff (the regular budget) might suffer. We skipped the regular stewardship campaign because (a) the "Over the Hill" drive was already one "ask" and (b) the response to it was so great we'd just look like putzes coming back for more.

When I came on to Council we had a standing rule that we wanted at least three months of operating costs as a reserve in our funds balance. Late last year our reserve fell below that number. We were hoping that the traditional December giving might solve the problem; however December 2018 giving was down significantly from 2017 and lower than 3 of the last 5 Decembers. As of March, our reserve stands at just over \$79,000. With an average monthly budget need of \$28,600 you can see we are still below our target reserve. So no trouble YET, but it's better to turn this thing around NOW. Council has put out the call to the ministries to tighten the belt and watch spending; but the other half is that we have to talk about encouraging giving. There are several factors affecting the balance of the two: our operating budget went up 3% this year; our December giving was dinged by tax laws that have generally lowered donations to all non-profits (we are not alone); but the truth is that our typical monthly giving is down. At the core is that Immanuel has lost some significant givers, either through death or because they moved away.

Now this is your turn. I prayerfully ask everybody to consider your giving to Immanuel and perhaps increasing that giving to continue the exciting and vibrant growth here at Immanuel. It all starts with each of us seeing if we can each help just a little bit more. To those who supported the OTH campaign: if you were/are monthly givers, perhaps consider rolling a part of that over to your regular giving when your OTH obligation is up. To everybody: consider electronic giving if you are not already doing so. Electronic giving makes it easier on you as you don't have to remember to do it each month and it will provide steady funding to Immanuel when you might be away and doing other things.

Immanuel is us. We have shown again and again that we step up and support causes and people doing God's work. We are in the midst of doing just that in the community and with each other. Please help Immanuel continue and grow that work by considering an increase in your giving. And I thank you for all that you do, all that you are and for your incredible heart for others.

### **Crisis Action Plan**

There is a team of members working on a crisis action plan for Immanuel. It deals with items like: fire, tornado, active shooters and health emergencies. The team has met with the fire and police department. In response to things we have learned as part of this process, we now lock the church door, even during office hours, if only one person is in the building.

You may notice, a new device outside the office door and soon outside the sanctuary door. It is called, *The Ring*; it is a video doorbell. It detects motion, and sends a notification to the staff. During office hours if someone rings the doorbell, we will do our best to answer, even if no one is in the building (we can answer from anywhere if we have our smartphone). We can talk to you through the doorbell, and you can hear us. For added security, we can see and hear you too. If you've lost your key to the church or if yours isn't working, please let us know. Also, make sure to have your key on you even during office hours just in case only one person is in the building.

## Tax Break for Contributions -people over 70 years-old

If you are over 70.5 did you know that you can give directly from your retirement account to Immanuel Lutheran Church and pay no taxes on the gift? Due to the tax changes that include a higher standard deduction and the elimination of the personal exemption, you may receive the best tax benefit if you donate directly from your retirement account.

## **Contributing Stocks or Bonds**

To contribute capital gain property such as stocks or bonds to the church, per IRS Publication 526 you can deduct the Fair Market Value of the asset on your personal tax returns - not the basis in the asset. Immanuel has a brokerage account to facilitate the transfer of these assets directly. If you are interested, please contact the church for information or assistance.

## Almsgiving Station High Five for 85 years of doing God's work through Samaritas

Why use the word alms or almsgiving? It comes from a Greek word that means mercy. In its original sense, when you give alms, you are dispensing mercy.

Each Lent we collect a special offering because it is the heart of our community and a season of almsgiving. Since we do not have a midweek worship service, this year, we will collect this offering a little differently. We will have an almsgiving station in the narthex. You will notice it because it will be a large hand on the wall. The offering will be going to Samaritas (supporting: senior living, foster care, refugees, building communities, and family support). Each time you give (whether it is \$5, \$55, or \$555) we ask that you take a sticker and give the hand a high five! Your alms will be collected at the almsgiving station in the box located there. ## Rev. Wayne Hoedt

Wayne F. Hoedt was born to Arthur and Loretta Hoedt on June 12, 1943 in Toledo, Ohio. He was welcomed into the Kingdom of God through the Sacrament of Holy Baptism on July 4, 1943 in St. Paul's Lutheran Church, Toledo.

Wayne graduated from Morrison R. Waite High School in May, 1961, Capital University, Columbus, Ohio with a B.A. in Humanities in 1966, and the Evangelical Lutheran Theological Seminary (now Trinity) with a Masters of Divinity in 1970.

On June 24, 1967, Wayne and Linda Lou Fagerlund of Worthington, Ohio were married in North Community Lutheran Church, Columbus. Linda also graduated from Capital University in 1967 with a B.S. in Business Education.

Parenthood was part of God's plan for Linda and Wayne as 5 children were gifted to them: Stephen (Kate), Karin (Russell), Marcia (David), Jeffrey, and Lauren (Steve). Eventually the gift of grandchildren was granted: Jacob, Evelyn, Alex, and Tommy.

From August 1967 to August 1968 Linda and Wayne lived in Salem, Ohio while he completed his internship at Emmanuel Lutheran Church. After his supervising pastor left Emmanuel after 6 months to accept another call, Wayne served as the full-time "pastor" until their departure in August. Ordination into full-time Christian ministry as an American Lutheran Church pastor took place on June 14, 1970 at St. Mark's Lutheran Church, Toledo (Wayne's home congregation).

Retirement was welcomed in June, 2007. Linda and Wayne then moved to the Mount Pleasant community, entering the first house of their own since everything else had been parsonages.

In October, 2011 Wayne joined the staff of Resurrection Lutheran Church, Saginaw as Assistant Pastor for Visitation. Retirement again ensued 5 years later.

In 2016 the house in Mt.Pleasant was sold; Linda and Wayne then moved to Columbus, Ohio to be closer to Marcia, Dave, Jacob and Evelyn. They are enjoying the retired life as part of a retirement community in Columbus just 5 minutes away from Marcia et al. Retirement was once defined for me as, "Waking up in the morning with nothing to do, and by bedtime it is only half done." Therefore, Linda and I find enough fellowship events to do within the retirement community of which we are a part; spending life with 9 year old Jacob and 4 year old Evelyn; volunteering several times a month at the U.S. Air Force Museum in Dayton, Ohio; and watching dance recitals and soccer games. God is blessing us each day.

#### **Rev. Jim Couser**

I am Pastor Jim Couser. My wife, Sandy, and I are excited to be spending some Sundays with you during your Pastor's upcoming sabbatical.

Allow me a brief introduction. I'm a native Detroiter, having been raised on the east side. I attended Detroit Public Schools through eighth grade and graduated from Lutheran High School East in 1968. My home congregation was St. James Lutheran Church, Grosse Pointe Farms. My mother (98 years old) currently resides in a nursing home near Detroit. Two of my three siblings are also retired from full time teaching and youth ministry. Being raised in the Lutheran Church-Missouri Synod and sensing the call to ministry, I graduated from Concordia College, Fort Wayne, IN, and began studies at Concordia Seminary, St. Louis. The early 70s were a time of strain and testing in the LC-MS. Consequently, I completed my pastoral training and received my Master of Divinity from Christ Seminary: Seminex in 1976.

Sandy was raised in the community of Rochester, MI, and graduated from Rochester High School. We met and began dating our first month of college (Ask Sandy about how she asked me out for our first date). She received her BS in Education from Concordia College, River Forest, IL. Sandy is the oldest of five siblings; two living in Oakland County just north of Detroit, one in Harrisville, MI, and one in Charlotte, NC. Sandy retired after over thirty years of teaching kindergarten and pre-school.

Sandy and I have been married 46 years. We were married the month before starting seminary. Our Vicarage/Internship was in Port Washington, WI. My first call was to serve as founding pastor of a congregation of the Association of Evangelical Lutheran Churches (the group that withdrew from the LC-MS and existed until the ELCA merger in 1988) in Lincoln, NE. We served that congregation, All Saints, Lincoln, for over ten years. From 1987-94, I served as Associate Pastor at Trinity Lutheran Church, Grand Rapids, MI. In February, 1994, I was called to serve St. Matthew Lutheran Church, Cridersville, OH (just outside Lima). I served there over 21 years, until my retirement in October 2015.

We have two children, Matthew and Rebecca. Each of our children has an elementary education degree from Valparaiso University. Matthew is the principal of Our Savior Lutheran School, Lansing, MI. His wife, Katie, is a nurse in the surgical unit of Sparrow Medical Center. They have three children: Ryan (11), Micah (9), and Ella (7). Our daughter, Rebecca, is on the staff of Calvary Lutheran Church, Clarkston, in the area of youth and family ministry. Rebecca is now engaged. Her fiancé, Tim Higgins, is currently in China. He finishes his teaching contract in August. A wedding date will be set when he returns.

In retirement, we've chosen to live in Lansing, primarily to be close to our grandchildren. We are members of Immanuel Lutheran Church, Grand Ledge, where we sing in the choir and regularly serve as assisting ministers in worship. I also share my guitar-playing skills in worship leadership. We both maintain a consistent exercise schedule (aerobics for Sandy, golf for me, walking, and biking). We enjoy all styles of music. I'm a diehard Detroit Tigers fan (I've even been to their winter Fantasy Camp a couple times). We enjoy traveling (we've been to 30 states and Grand Cayman since retiring and will be in Europe for three weeks this fall).

Like most "down-staters, we've spent some recreational time in mid-Michigan - for many years Sandy's family had a place on Wixom Lake. We've spent time biking the Pierre Marquette Trail near Midland.
