A letter from the Congregational Council...

From Congregational Council

The heart of man plans his way, but the LORD establishes his steps. • Proverbs 16:9

Make no mistake, this article is not about asking members of the congregation to increase their giving to the church.

It is about us as the Immanuel Lutheran Congregational Council being transparent about the status of the church's finances so there are no budgetary surprises at our Annual Congregational Meeting Sunday, September 22nd.

As is standard every year, Congregational Council and members of the congregation's ministry teams have spent the past few months evaluating the church's finances in order to plan and budget for next year. This includes working together to best navigate and provide for Immanuel's congregational and spiritual needs in the response to the volatile economy we and the rest of the nation are facing.

Truth be told: Immanuel Lutheran Church is currently financially stable and has what it needs to operate and position itself for the future. However, some of the "rainy day" funds will soon be needed to cover where giving will fall short of what is budgeted for monthly expenses.

And this is why we as a council are sharing this news here in June so that there isn't any shock come September 22nd that Immanuel was operating "in the red" for three months and that the budget was tighter than previous years. As a church, Immanuel is strong and is in a good place.

We as a congregation, are merely making plans for our future while asking for God's guidance to help lead the way. In this spirit, we want to inform you that at the annual meeting in September, the council will present a plan for addressing our financial shortfall and strategic planning. Currently, we are revising the budget to accurately reflect our expenditures, envisioning a congregational strategic plan, and exploring alternative funding sources such as grants and new giving opportunities. A financial ask may eventually be part of this process. Please pray for our continued guidance.



Contributing Stocks or Bonds

To contribute capital gain property such as stocks or bonds to the church, per IRS Publication 526 you can deduct the Fair Market Value of the asset on your personal tax returns - not the basis in the asset. Immanuel has a brokerage account to facilitate the transfer of these assets directly. If you are interested, please contact the church for information or assistance.

Tax Break for Contributions -people over 73 years-old

If you are over 73 did you know that you can give directly from your retirement account to Immanuel Lutheran Church and pay no taxes on the gift? Due to the tax changes that include a higher standard deduction and the elimination of the personal exemption, you may receive the best tax benefit if you donate directly from your retirement account.

On Sunday, August 25, we will meet at Island Park to worship with fellow congregations in town, like our brothers and sisters at First Presbyterian, with a Potluck following!

Summer 2024 – Six Women from Church History that You Need to Know About – Let's learn together in six evenings of fellowship.

Approximately 150 men and women attended our Synod's Adult Education program on Six Women from Church History that You Need to Know About. This lively, interesting and informative class was taught by the Rev. Dr. Joy Schroeder, an ELCA pastor, is Professor of Church History at Capital University, where she teaches in the Department of Religion and Philosophy and Trinity Lutheran Seminary

This class was recorded and the Synod has given Immanuel permission to use these classes in our Adult Education Program. We are inviting <u>men</u> and <u>women</u> to attend the classes this summer. We will meet 5:30 - 7:30 for a light dinner and beverages. We will watch the videos and then engage in discussion.

The class will meet on six consecutive Wednesday evenings. Each class is a stand alone session. You do not have to attend all the classes.

Ever since the beginning of Christianity, women have been teachers, writers, and preachers of the Gospel. Learn about the struggles and accomplishments of six exemplary women from church history:

The schedule for the program is:

- July 24 Perpetua (d. ca. 202), North African martyr and visionary writer
- July 31 Hildegard of Bingen (1098-1179), Saxon nun and theologian
- August 7 Argula von Grumbach (ca. 1492-ca. 1554), Bavarian Lutheran reformer and pamphlet writer
- August 14 Sor Juana Inés de la Cruz (1648-1695), Mexican nun and poet
- August 21 Jarena Lee (1783-1864), African American preacher
- August 28 Pandita Ramabai (1858-1922), Indian Bible translator and founder of women's shelters

CONGREGATIONAL COUNCIL ANNUAL RETREAT

APRIL 27, 2024

PRESENT: Dan Digmann, Beth Mundwiler, Rachael Nelson, Diane Thomas, Rose Prasad, Pr. Dana Hendershot, Sarah Gilbert, Gabe Goodrich, Mark Strandskov ABSENT: Linda Wicander, Stacl Couch

- The retreat was called to order at 9:05 am.
- The retreat was opened by Pastor Dana with a devotional that focused on symbols of the Christian faith and how each of us viewed a symbol.
- We then broke into pairs or triads for cares and/or concerns, prayers, and blessings.
- NEXT, council discussed the future of Stephen Ministry at Immanuel and what the Stephen Ministry leadership thought would be best. After discussion, council supported Gail Mitchell, Stephen Ministry coordinator, and the other Stephen Ministers to create a model that might better fit Immanuel.
- Council then broke for a breakfast brunch provided by council members.
- Chuck Clise presented on the possibilities for solar energy for Immanuel. He presented scenarios for locations of solar panels, the amounts of energy each configuration would generate, and upkeep/maintenance. He also discussed the tax credit available for providing solar energy to the electric grid.
- Dave Simon presented on budget issues, effective uses of Immanuel's funds and how the endowment funds work. Many of us in council were not familiar with the endowment funds. Dave educated council on how the endowment funds provide income and then how that income is distributed.
- BUDGET will be a major concern for our congregation as we move into 2024-2025 budget year. Ted Tuma, Steve and Jan Podolsky and Pastor Dana continue to discuss budget projections along with anticipated giving. Discussion ensued on how to plan for the next five years including a capital campaign and growing the endowment fund. Also discussed were ideas about living legacy giving.
- In the budget discussion, it was moved by Rose and seconded by Mark to provide the \$400 for the Senior Stipends for graduating high school seniors Isabel Goodrich and Abbie Powell, ad \$3450 for the ELCA Youth Gathering from the Mission Endowment Fund. Motion passed with two abstentions.
- It was suggested that the Community and World mission group take a larger role in distributing \$\$ to community groups such as ICRH, Community Compassion Network and others.
- The retreat closed with a discussion about what council members thought Immanuel was "missing". Members wrote ideas and then shared them with the larger group. This discussion will continue at the next council meeting.
