A letter from Pastor Dana...

Friends in Christ,

As fall approaches, I can feel the energy and momentum building. This feeling was clear when Sherry and I sat at Mainstage, engaging with CMU students returning to campus. I felt spirit-filled as I rang the chimes with our children and listened to the congregation sing, "Jesus Loves Me." Soon, we kick off a Worship Wednesday program and our nursery will be open on Sunday mornings!

As we begin new programs this fall, the council is also starting a **strategic planning process**. Please remember to **complete the survey before Sept. 15.** There are pink printed copies in the Narthex, or access the online survey through the link provided on page 6.

Our mission statement says, "We are blessed with a beautiful church home filled with a wealth of resources. We continue to share it with individuals and groups who serve, and also to make it accessible and welcoming to all." Here are a few ways you'll see us carrying out this part of our mission this fall:

- We host an 8-cap playgroup for Early Head Start families.
- We host the Mid-Michigan Community Action food distribution once a month.
- This fall, we will host the Cub Scouts while Community Church is under construction.
- We host Suzuki Sprouts, a music class for babies.
- We will host a Red Cross Blood Drive on Thursday, Sept. 19.
- Our parking lot is available to the Middle School teachers to make their walk more convenient.
- We have opened our shed to Christmas Outreach and Immanuel Village during their renovation.
- We will provide parking for Immanuel Village while their parking lot is under construction. Additionally, they will use our golf cart to shuttle residents between our parking lot and theirs. (Construction is set to start on Sept. 30).
- During the last week of October, we will house ICRH guests.
- Soon, we will begin bathroom renovations, including making our single bathroom ADA compliant.

Our building is a gift, and I am grateful that we continue to make it part of our mission to share it with organizations that serve and transform lives. I am praying for the strategic planning process to energize our mission and ministries. God is good! Today, I pray that everyone who enters our doors experiences Christ's love. May we be a beacon of light in the darkness, a source of hope for the hopeless, a comforting space for the weary, a safe space for those in crisis, a place of healing for the sick, and a place of love amidst dissent. In all these things, may Christ be revealed.

ELCA Social Statement


The ELCA is developing a social statement on **civic life and faith**, the relationship of church and state, and related matters, as called for by the 2019 ELCA Churchwide Assembly.

Pastor Dana would like to offer a time to review this so we may offer our feedback as Immanuel Lutheran Church. We will meet following worship at 11:30 AM (give me some time to greet people) on **Sunday, Sept. 8, 15 & 29** (the 22nd is our annual meeting). No need to do research ahead of time unless you'd like to.

Social statements are the ELCA's primary documents to address significant social issues. They are intended to aid reflection, shape conscience and set forth the ELCA's teaching and policy on the major social issues and questions of contemporary life. Social statements are developed by task forces, using an established process of study and widespread participation across the church to guide theological and moral deliberation.

At this time the task force encourages you to study and give feedback on a <u>draft version of the social statement</u>. They provide us a way to share our feedback after discussing this draft statement.

Strategic Planning at Immanuel

It is time to look at our current ministries and set some goals for our future! To start, Immanuel Lutheran Church Council created a survey for congregational insight on the current and future direction of our ministry. The goal of this survey is to get your perspective on what Immanuel Lutheran Church is called to do. Please know that this survey includes open-ended questions that require thought and prayer to answer fully. Consider reading through a paper copy of the survey (available at church), taking notes, and then filling out this survey (or just turning in a paper copy). Feedback from the congregation will go a long way to help guide decision making (e.g., budgetary decisions and resources) to meet God's calling for our church. Please know that this will be a process starting with this will be a process starting with this survey (August 15 – Sept. 15) and moving to focus groups. We will present preliminary findings from this survey at our Annual Meeting with the congregation on September 22 following worship.

Contributing Stocks or Bonds

To contribute capital gain property such as stocks or bonds to the church, per IRS Publication 526 you can deduct the Fair Market Value of the asset on your personal tax returns - not the basis in the asset. Immanuel has a brokerage account to facilitate the transfer of these assets directly. If you are interested, please contact the church for information or assistance.

Tax Break for Contributions -people over 73 years-old

If you are over 73 did you know that you can give directly from your retirement account to Immanuel Lutheran Church and pay no taxes on the gift? Due to the tax changes that include a higher standard deduction and the elimination of the personal exemption, you may receive the best tax benefit if you donate directly from your retirement account.

Thus, our Stephen Ministry is transitioning into a visitation ministry, and everyone is welcome to participate. If you are interested, please speak with Pastor Dana.


