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

Friends in Christ,

This month, I place in your hands a big piece of me. I wrote our Lenten devotional, *Kalos Faith*. For those who have been part of this community since my arrival in 2011, you've likely heard or read most of it before. But if you're anything like me, you've gone back and reread an old sermon or journal entry and thought, *I don't remember writing that*.... That realization always reminds me—it doesn't hurt to say it again.

I pray that while some of these stories may be familiar, they still meet you where you are right now, speaking to your heart in ways you might not expect.

Last month, I shared the history of how this devotional came to be. This month, I invite you on a journey of self-discovery—opening yourself to the infinite and embracing both the joy and the sorrow in your life.

I've said numerous times as a pastor, "The craziest thing I've learned is that everyone's life sucks." And every time I say it, I know it doesn't sound quite right. But the truth remains: there is pain in every human story. It is different for each of us. It is real.

Yet within that pain, we experience glimmers—glimmers of love, breath, and blessing. That is my hope for this devotional. That it may be for you a glimmer of life. A glimmer of hope. A glimmer of mercy.

Lent is a season of wilderness, but the truth is—we are already in it. Life itself is the wilderness. And yet, we get this sacred time—40+ days—to pause, to reflect, to refocus on who God calls us to be.

Jesus was driven into the wilderness for 40 days. The good news? He is already there. You are not alone.

Lenten Theme



When I was little my dad had a Jacques Cousteau encyclopedia collection. It sat on a book shelf around a big sliding glass door, offering an immense amount of natural light and a view of our wooded backyard. The encyclopedias were low on the shelves, just the right height for a little girl. I would flip through the underwater photos and escape into this beautiful new world to explore.

I grew up in Michigan with a family that didn't travel much outside of Michigan or Ohio. So, the first time I saw the ocean, it was glorious. I was in high school, traveling with my mother, who was in her forties. I was visiting a college out west, and she took me to the Pacific Ocean! It was her first time seeing it, too, and she shared my glee. I didn't want to just see it; I wanted to be out on it, so we went whale watching. It was like living the pages I had dreamed about as I sifted through the encyclopedias in that Michigan light.

What I didn't know about was seasickness. That reality wasn't in the pages of the books I had so adored! My dream world quickly turned green and nauseating. Surprisingly, it didn't stop my joy. In the midst of that suffering, I was still living a dream.

Who knew, three years later, I'd be studying in the Florida Keys for a semester. As part of our study, we went out on an oceanographic vessel for a few days in the Atlantic. It is probably one of the most profound experiences of my life, and I never would have gone if I'd let my seasickness hold me back.

Joy and suffering coexist. This book will take you on a journey through the playful theology of God at work in the ordinary, everyday things of life—from playing in the snow and the rain to the profound experience of being treated for Large Cell B Non-Hodgkin's Lymphoma. And yes, I found joy and insights into life and love on the darkest days. I hope you do, too. Don't like what's going on? Change your angle, turn the wheel on the kaleidoscope through which you're viewing life, and God will transform the mundane and the suffering into joy— it is beautiful. *Kalos* is the Greek word for beautiful—it is a beautiful faith. We were created by the same God, and we each see her a little differently. I wonder what God will reveal to you in these pages.


Time Line of Strategic Planning Process

- Finalize the Strategic Plan and present the Stewardship campaign After Easter


Ministry with Each Other

Volunteers needed for Church Lawn Mowing

For more than twenty years, members of the church have mowed the lawn. The church has several riding lawn mowers including two zero-turn machines. The front lawn is mowed about 25 time each season while the back lawn is mowed about 15 times.

We mow in teams. The front takes about two hours to mow and the back about the same two hours. A group of two people on riding mowers and one person doing the trim work can be done in an hour and a half.

A mowing schedule will be published in mid-April. We hope to assemble about six groups to do the mowing.

Contributing Stocks or Bonds

To contribute capital gain property such as stocks or bonds to the church, per IRS Publication 526 you can deduct the Fair Market Value of the asset on your personal tax returns - not the basis in the asset. Immanuel has a brokerage account to facilitate the transfer of these assets directly. If you are interested, please contact the church for information or assistance.

Tax Break for contributions – people over 70 1/2 years-old

If you are over 70.5 did you know that you can give directly from your retirement account to Immanuel Lutheran Church and no pay taxes on the gift? Due to the tax changes that include a higher standard deduction and the elimination of the personal exemption it is possible the best tax benefit for contributions to the church is to give directly from your retirement account.
